

From the Pastor 7th Sunday of Easter - A May 24, 2020

TRIALS ARE NOTHING ELSE BUT THE FORGE THAT PURIFIES THE SOUL OF ALL ITS IMPERFECTIONS." Our great Catholic Faith offers many ways for God and us to communicate with each other. While not every method is for everyone, there are some <u>NON-</u> optional means of prayer, like the Sacraments,

especially the *Most Holy Eucharist*. Some means, like the *Liturgy of the Hours* [Morning/ Evening Prayer] are obligatory for most Clergy and Religious. Some 'find God' and serve Him by performing works of mercy; we have

devotions, like the *Rosary, Novenas, Stations of the Cross,* etc. Some take an academic route to God through their study of Scripture, the Saints or the Church. Many, if not most, use a

combination of the many methods available for us to grow in our Faith.

This week we honor a woman whose method may be the <u>least</u> understood means of prayer: Christian mystical, ecstatic visions and personal revelations. However, it should not be so strange, for *Saint Paul the Apostle* had many mystical experiences: he received the 'stigmata' or marks of Christ's crucifixion on his body [Galatians 6:17]; had a vision of heaven [Ephesians 3:8-9] and a blinding vision of the *Risen Lord* [Acts 9:1-18; 22:3-16; 26:2-18]. Before reviewing *Saint Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi's* ecstatic

visions, pray the Collect for the Mass celebrated on her optional Feast Day: *May 25* and whose quote above, on the benefits of suffering, captures the essence of her teachings.

Collect - Saint Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi, Virgin

O God, lover of virginity, who adorned with heavenly gifts the Virgin Saint Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi, setting her on fire with your love, grant, we pray, that we, who honor her today, may imitate her example of purity and love. Through our Lord Jesus ... for ever and ever. Amen.

"LOVE IS NOT LOVED." This sad lament, which Saint Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi wrote in her accounts of her visions, that "Love is not loved," permeated everything she strove to do and experienced. Admittedly, some 'methods' she used to 'love the God who is so often not loved' may seem strange, even bizarre to us, but they were common religious practices in her time. However, we must ask ourselves if we have gone too far the other way by rejecting any and every means of suffering or self-denial as a just and beneficial 'penance.' So maybe we need to imitate what *Saint Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi*

tried to teach us.

Born in Florence, Italy, on April 2, 1556, baptized *Catherine* or *Catrina*, she became a Carmelite cloistered nun - taking her name in honor of *Mary Magdalene* - when she was 16. She had learned at an early age how to pray - not only with <u>memorized words</u> - but in <u>prayerful silence</u>. [I think we'd all agree we ALL need MORE silence in our hectic, noisy world!] In response to all that God 'revealed' to her in her 'visions' and 'ecstasies', she performed severe penances, lest she become inflated with pride - just as *Saint Paul* admitted he was given *"a thorn in the flesh"* [2 Corinthians 12:6-7] that kept him from becoming too elated with his special revelations and other spiritual gifts.

She chose to enter the *Saint Mary of the Angels Carmelite Monastery* since its nuns had unique permission [rare in those days!] to receive <u>daily</u> Eucharist. This enabled her to establish a very personal relationship with Jesus; in one vision, when Jesus chided her for not replying to Him, she lightheartedly retorted: *"You didn't call loudly enough!"* - and then told Him to <u>shout</u> His love.

Nor was she content to rest from worldly woes or current issues; she wrote letters to the pope and other church officials, demanding they do <u>more</u> to implement the Council of Trent's policies for refuting the Protestant Reformation. Like *Saint [Mother] Teresa of Calcutta* and many other Saints, she experienced the '*dark night of the soul:*'dreadful times of spiritual dryness,

unanswered prayers, devastating doubt, and frightening temptations - like those Jesus Himself experienced in His 40-day desert fast.

She continued to fight every assault from Satan with prayer, penance and humble service. All this took a toll on her body; in 1604, she was confined to bed due to headaches and paralyzation; after 3 years of intense pain, she died on *May 25*, 1607 at the age of 46. She is the Patron Saint against bodily ills and sexual temptations. *Saint Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi, pray for us.*
