

According to the Common Policy adopted by the Bishops of New Jersey, this preparation requires attendance at a marriage preparation program (Pre-Cana) as well as sessions with the parish deacon or priest. Therefore, couples should make arrangements at the Parish Office one year before the planned wedding date and before finalizing any social plans.

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From the Pastor 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time - A June 28, 2020

OF MARTYRS IS THE SEED OF THE CHURCH." These words, which most attribute to a Christian theologian, Tertullian [circa: 155-240] have

been repeated - and lived out - by Christians of every age and in every time and place.

According to Tradition, 10 of the original *Twelve Apostles* and *Saint Paul* were martyred [Judas committed suicide and *Saint John* died of old age.] In our own time, Christians in many

radical Islamic countries and in Communist China face violent persecution and even execution. In recent decades, Communist, Fascist, Nazi and other evil regimes have tried to destroy the Church. And in between these times, others have sought - and failed - to prove Jesus wrong when He told our first Pope: "And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." [Matthew 16:18]

Each year, one day after we honor two great martyrs on the *June 28th Solemnity of Saints*

Peter and Paul, Apostles, we honor the countless, nameless unknowns who paid the ultimate price for their Faith in the first century of our Church's history: *the June 30th Optional*

Memorial of the First Martyrs of Holy Roman Church. Women and men, young and old, baptized or catechumen, rich and poor, noble or commoner, they were brutalized and executed. Accosted on the street, dragged out of religious services, turned in by neighbors or even loved ones, these brave souls chose NOT to deny their Faith. They suffered and gave their life for the Faith we so often take for granted. As we pray the Collect for the Mass offered in their honor, may we grow in the strength to faithfully proclaim our Faith in Jesus Christ and His Church - despite all costs!

<u>Collect - The First Martyrs of Holy Roman Church</u> O God, who consecrated the abundant first fruits of the Roman Church by the blood of the Martyrs, grant, we pray, that with firm courage we may together draw strength from so great a struggle and ever rejoice at the triumph of faithful love. Through our Lord Jesus ... for ever and ever. Amen. Saint John Paul II once noted, that there are many ways to be a martyr in our times. He noted, simply swimming against the tide, standing up against the status quo, being the voice of the voiceless, the defender of the defenseless, the promoter of Gospel values and other divine

mandates in a world that seems to be increasingly rejecting God and His Church, are all forms of martyrdom! And another Saint said: "You were tempted by the spirit of fornication, but feared the coming judgment of Christ and did not want your purity of mind and body to be defiled: you are a martyr for Christ ... You were tempted by the spirit of avarice to seize the property of a child and violate the rights of a defenseless widow, but remembered God's law and saw your duty to give help, not act unjustly: you are a witness to Christ ... You were tempted by the spirit of pride but saw the poor and the needy and looked with loving compassion on them, and loved humility rather than arrogance: you are a witness to Christ." [From a commentary of Psalm 188 by St. Ambrose, Bishop.]

SEEK HELP FROM ABOVE TO BE A MARTYR. Whether we are called to shed our tears as we face ridicule, opposition and scorn from those who reject and even work to eliminate Christian morals and values from our world - or to shed our blood for the One who shed His Blood for us - the Bible assures us: we are *"surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses"* [Hebrews 12:1] - the Saints who bravely, gloriously gave their life for the Lord and who now root us on to victory! May we faithfully follow in the footsteps of all who, for over two millennia, gave their all for God and Church! *The First Martyrs of Holy Roman Church, pray for us*!

This is Father Dan's last Sunday with us. Please read his letter and my letter in this weeks' bulletin. Also, pray for our country as we celebrate Independence Day on Saturday. Pray also for our President, Governor, Mayor and all who lead us.

Farewell and Thank You, Father Dan

This the last weekend Father Dan will be with us. He leaves for his new assignment on Tuesday. I want to thank Father Dan for his service to our parish and for all the assistance he has given to me this past year. He has been a great

asset. His Bible Study on the Mass was most successful. He was planning to do another one this spring, but the Wuhan Virus came and suddenly, in a matter of days, our lives went from ordinary to being turned upside down. There has been a sudden and collective loss of our normal.

This has been unfortunate for Father Dan and for us as a parish. Each priest brings his own gifts and talents to his ministry. Each parish experience strengthens a priest in his vocation and from each parish experience, he, with the grace of God, is enriched in his priesthood.

Father did not get the full experience of parish life here at St. Justin Parish and we did not get to experience his gifts and to get to know him well. We both suffered a loss.

This is the first time, since I have been pastor, I am writing a farewell to a priest without welcoming another to our parish. This is a sad reality. St. Clement Parish in Matawan and our parish are two parishes in our diocese this year that will now only have one priest to minister to the people of God. Other parishes already only have one resident priest. The reason for this is the shortage of vocations over the past several years. In 2019, the diocese did not ordain any men to the priesthood. This year one was ordained yesterday in a live-streamed ordination rite. Next year, only one man will be ordained for service in our diocese. As Father Dan states in his letter, the number of retirements far exceeds the number of ordinations each year.

Father Owen Campion states the following regarding the decline in vocations:

"Fewer vocations are symptoms of a much greater problem in our culture. Another symptom is the state of marriage and family life. Silly assumptions that stress never comes to marriages, cohabitation outside marriage, avoidance of parenting, exclusion of God from life, and the cultural acceptance if not expectation of divorce add to the problem.

At its root is emphasizing "me, myself, and I." This attitude is crippling us Americans by the millions, is weakening the Church and is eroding our national life."

This has been a very hard year for our country, our Church and our families. The pandemic, the tragic death of George Floyd at the hands of a Minneapolis police officer and the protests that turned into violence, looting and rioting have left us wondering about the future. Protesting and political dissent are legitimate when they are peaceful. But violence is not legitimate. Despite what some politicians and media outlets may say, there should be no confusing peaceful protesters with looters, arsonists and those who would kill police officers. The violent rioting, the assaults on police officers, the destruction of property and looting is inexcusable. In fact, it demonstrates a disregard for the sacredness of human life – the very truth the demonstrations seek to hallow by expressing just anger at the manner of Mr. Floyd's brutal and needless death.

As to the question about the future, we can say with certainty that the Church's mission will not change. Jesus shared in our humanity so that we may share in his divinity. We witness to the world and all those we encounter, the divinity of our human nature with compassion, forgiveness, mercy, joy and hope. This is the mission of the Church and all baptized Christians.

From the very beginning of our country, faith has played a key role in shaping our culture and our country. The Judeo-Christian values which made our country great, albeit not without flaws, must be restored if we are to survive and live in freedom. Until America returns to God, we will continue to see the moral decline we are witnessing in these times.

At the end of Matthew's Gospel Jesus commands the Apostles to go into all the world and proclaim the Gospel to all creatures (Matthew 28:19). So we thank Father Dan and pray that he, along with other priests, religious, deacons and laity will be successful in bringing Christ to a hurting world.

God bless you, Father Dan, thank you and know that you are always welcome here at St. Justin Parish.

Guidelines for the Sacrament of Reconciliation:



The sacrament will be available again beginning Saturday, June 20, 2020 at the regular time of 3:30 p.m. — The sacrament **will not be offered in the church** as was the norm before the virus pandemic. **Instead**, those seeking the sacrament will utilize the two doors on the RE building side of the church. The penitent will walk up to one of the doors and knock and the priest will open the door and hear the confession. The penitent

and the priest must both be wearing face masks and practicing social distancing of 6 feet.

—-Those waiting in line must also wear masks and distance themselves 6 feet from the next person in line. The line will begin where the asphalt meets the grass and wrap around to the parking lot side of the church.

—--The penitent will keep in mind that their confession will be as brief as possible. Confession, as it has in the past, is not the time to seek counsel; Confession is not a therapy session. Confession, in simple terms, is confessing ones sins, the priest may give some brief comments then the penitent receives the penance, then Act of Contrition and Absolution.

Missing Sunday Mass and Holy Days of Obligation is still under a dispensation until September 7, 2020, so there is no need to confess missing Mass. -Weather permitting.-

These guidelines are in place until further advised.



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
