MARRIAGE: The Sacrament of Marriage requires a time of spiritual preparation. According to the Common Policy adopted by the Bishops of New Jersey, this preparation requires attendance at a marriage preparation program (Pre-Cana) as well as sessions with the parish deacon or priest. Therefore, couples should make arrangements at the Parish Office one year before the planned wedding date and before finalizing any social plans.

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From the Pastor 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time - A July 12, 2020

THE LILY OF THE MOHAWKS.' This week we honor the one and only Native American [so far] to be canonized: Saint Kateri Tekakwitha: born in 1656 in what may now be the town of Auriesville,

NY, about 40 miles northwest of Albany. Devotion to her began soon after her death on *April 17, 1680,* when she was 24, but she was only declared '*Venerable'* [the title given to one for whom the canonization process has begun] in 1943. She was '*Beatified'* [the last step before Sainthood] by *Pope Saint John Paul II* on June 30, 1980 and '*Canonized'* [added to the Church's 'canon' or 'catalog' of Saints] by Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI on October 21, 2012.

A Saint's Feast Day is usually his or her last day on earth/first day in heaven, but since *Saint Kateri* died on a day that usually falls in *Holy Week* or *Easter Week*, her *Feast Day is July 14*. However, Catholics in Canada and some Native American communities honor her on *April 17*. Baptized on Easter Sunday, April 5, 1676, she took the name *Kateri* or *Catherine*, in honor of *Saint Catherine of Siena* to whom she was devoted. We do not know what her parents originally named her, but her Iroquois name - *Tekakwitha* - suggests she bore some crosses, which led her to Christ and His Church. More on that after praying the Collect for the holy Mass offered on her Feast Day.

Collect - Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, Virgin

O God, who desired the Virgin Saint Kateri Tekakwitha to flower among Native Americans in a life of innocence, grant, through her intercession, that when all are gathered into your Church from every nation, tribe and tongue, they may magnify you in a single canticle of praise. Through our Lord Jesus ... for ever and ever. Amen.

"WHEN YOU WERE BORN, YOU CRIED AND THE WORLD REJOICED. LIVE YOUR LIFE SO THAT WHEN YOU DIE, THE WORLD CRIES AND YOU REJOICE."
This Cherokee proverb is apt for the child born of a Christian Algonquin mother and a Mohawk chief. When she was 4, her parents and her only brother died during a smallpox

epidemic which horribly scarred her face. It also impaired her vision, which seems to be why she had the Iroquois name 'Tekakwitha' which means 'she who bumps into things.' Adopted by an uncle and two aunts, she lived a secluded life. To keep her away from the 'Black Robes' or Jesuit Priests - who, because of a peace treaty with France, Native Americans had to permit in their villages - they tried to force her to marry a Mohawk brave, but she prevailed.

Then they tried to divert her from anything Catholic; they ridiculed her religious practices; forced her to work on Sundays; tried to trick her into marriage; and her uncles even urged others to molest her. Yet she remained positive and loving. Eventually, she fled her village, became a catechist - learning about the Faith as she taught others - and maintained a prayerful relationship with the Lord. Her Jesuit spiritual director dissuaded her and her friends from starting a Religious Order, but she made a vow of virginity on March 25, 1679; a year later, she fell seriously ill and, after receiving Viaticum, died on Wednesday of Holy Week, 1680. Some say her first miracle occurred immediately: after breathing her last: the face of the one called 'The Lily of the **Mohawks'** was beautifully restored!

Some may dismiss this cute 'Hallmark' ending, but many have been, and continue to be, cured through her intercession. Her courage is evident in that, being born barely 9 years after the Jesuits *Saint Isaac Jogues* and others were tomahawked to death, and *Saint John de Brébeuf* and others were violently tortured to death, she was willing to pay the price for being a Catholic. As she found Jesus, His Church, and the path to holiness through every cross she bore, so must we!

Of course, she did not do this alone. She had a good Christian mother who planted the seeds that others watered. She had the support of good Priests, Catholic friends, and, above all, she sought out a community that helped her live out her Faith. So can we with the help of *Saint Kateri Tekakwitha*, one of the Patron Saints of people in exile, Native Americans, ecology and the environment. *Saint Kateri Tekakwitha*, *Lily of the Mohawks, pray for us.*
