From the Pastor 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time - C July 28, 2019

A SAINT WHO REMINDS US: "BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU WISH OR PRAY FOR!" We often hear the common adage: "Be careful what you wish or pray for!" It is usually uttered in reference to - or by someone who hoped for something and got it ... only to regret it.

This adage aptly applies to the Bishop we honor on his *Feast Day* this *Friday, August 2: Saint Eusebius of Vercelli.* His name is pronounced *"u-SEE-be-us"* which was, centuries ago, believe it or not, a common Christian name. It means 'very holy' or 'pious' like the saintly name of twelve Popes: *Pius*. Born around 283, *Saint Eusebius* died peacefully, of advanced age, in his own Diocese of Vercelli in northern Italy, on August 1, 371. So, what made him a Saint? Pray his Collect; then we'll explain.

<u>Collect - Saint Eusebius of Vercelli, Bishop</u> Lead us, Lord God, to imitate the constancy of Saint Eusebius in affirming the divinity of your Son, so that, by preserving the faith he taught as your Bishop, we may merit a share in the very life of your Son. Who lives and reigns ... for ever and ever. Amen.

SEPARATION OF CHURCH & STATE WOES.

Innumerable prayers were answered when, in 313, the Emperor Constantine made *Christianity* the Roman Empire's official religion. Christians could finally gather without fear of persecution or execution; our Bishops even called a Council in *Nicaea*, in modern-day Turkey, to codify our faith and compose the *Nicene Creed* which we still profess to this day! That *Creed* was

supposed to settle the question: was Jesus 'just God' - 'just a man' or, as we proudly profess, **BOTH GOD** and **MAN.** Sadly, that did <u>not</u> settle the issue, for a Priest named <u>Arian</u> promoted a

heresy named after him: <u>Arianism</u>, which said Jesus was ONLY human, NOT God, which would invalidate every adaptation Jesus made to the Jewish faith.

As was the custom in those days, *Eusebius* was <u>*ELECTED*</u> Bishop by the people - which seems like a good idea ... but people 'voted' for Bishops

they preferred, not those who were orthodox. Luckily, *Saint Eusebius* was truly Catholic and not a closet *Arian*. However, to keep the peace, many secular rulers interfered in how the Church ended squabbles and bitter fights over unsettled issues ... and often tried to 'sway' -'prod' or even 'force' the Church to profess what the local <u>secular</u> leaders believed. So, we got what we prayed for ... and suffered because of it!

<u>A BISHOP WHO PRESERVED THE FAITH</u>. In calling *Eusebius* to be a Bishop, God gave us a

courageous man that brutal attacks and violent opposition could not dissuade from the Truth. Over his long life [he died at 88], he was beaten often; his home was ransacked; his possessions were stolen or destroyed; he was exiled and threatened with death. Yet he remained firm ... and kindhearted. For after peace was restored to the Church and the dust settled, *Saint*

Eusebius - with *Saint Athanasius* - insisted that Bishops who had given into political pressure or fear - and became *Arians* - were to be welcomed back - if they just performed a *moderate*

penance and publicly professed the *Nicene Creed.*

<u>A BISHOP WHO CONSOLED HIS FLOCK</u>. With so many conflicts, disagreements and scandals splintering his flock, *Bishop Eusebius* wrote

letters to console and comfort them. In art, he is depicted writing a letter to his people. What a timely reminder for us as we struggle with the all-too-human flaws of clergy and ordinary Christians who make us question our divine *Christian Faith*. While we cannot deny the flaws that show our tarnished side, the Church and our Faith are much more than we who strive to follow - and often fail to live up to - the ideals Jesus gave us. May *Saint Eusebius* help us remember that we hold a *divine treasure* in very *fallible earthen vessels* - and that we must be compassionate with all who fail but repent.

LEARN & LET GO. Two ways we can honor *Saint Eusebius* is to, one: learn more about our Faith so that we can explain it to those who question it - and, two: forgive those who, under pressure or human weakness, fail to be all God calls us to be. What would *Saint Eusebius* want you to do in his honor? *Saint Eusebius of Vercelli, pray for us.*

An Opportunity to Witness the Sacrament of Confirmation

If you don't remember your own Confirmation or you have never witnessed someone else's, you will have the opportunity to witness a Confirmation at the 12 noon Mass on Sunday, August 4th. The Bishop is the ordinary minister of the Sacrament of Confirmation, but he can delegate priests to confirm. I am grateful that Bishop O'Connell has granted me delegation to confirm a young woman on August 4th and thought I would do a quick review of the Sacrament.

The Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist are called the Sacraments of Initiation. In order to live the Sacramental life, we must fully understand what these three Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist are, as well as what they are for us through our full participation in them. The Kingdom of God is sustained and kept alive by Christians who are living the Sacramental life. The three Cardinal virtues, Faith, Hope, and Love, are given to us through Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist, and the Church has given us these Sacraments in order to help us live these virtues more fully. This makes us co-redeemers in the Kingdom of God. These three Sacraments lay the foundations of every Christian life.

Baptism is the first of the Sacraments of Initiation. The Catechism describes Baptism in this way: "Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (vitae spiritualis ianua), and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission: "Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water in the word." (CCC 1213)

Confirmation is the strengthening process of the graces we already received in Baptism. The sacrament of Confirmation perfects Baptismal grace; it is the sacrament which gives the Holy Spirit in order to root us more deeply in the divine filiation, incorporate us more firmly into Christ, strengthen our bond with the Church, associate us more closely with her mission, and help us bear witness to the Christian faith in words accompanied by deeds. (CCC, 1316) Confirmation, like Baptism, imprints a spiritual mark or indelible character on the Christian's soul; for this reason one can receive this sacrament only once in one's life. (CCC, 1317)The traditional ordering of the Sacraments is Baptism – Confirmation – Eucharist. Only in the last 100 years or so has the process changed to have Confirmation come after Eucharist. The essential rite of Confirmation is anointing the forehead of the baptized with sacred chrism, together with the laying on of the minister's hand and the words: "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit." (CCC, 1320) When Confirmation is celebrated separately from Baptism, its connection with Baptism is expressed, among other ways, by the renewal of baptismal promises. The celebration of Confirmation during the Eucharist helps underline the unity of the sacraments of Christian initiation. (CCC, 1321)

The Eucharist is the heart and the summit of the Church's life, for in it Christ associates his Church and all her members with his sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving offered once for all on the cross to his Father; by this sacrifice he pours out the graces of salvation on his Body which is the Church. (CCC, 1407) The Eucharistic celebration always includes: the proclamation of the Word of God; thanksgiving to God the Father for all his benefits, above all the gift of his Son; the consecration of bread and wine; and participation in the liturgical banquet by receiving the Lord's body and blood. These elements constitute one single act of worship. (CCC, 1408) The Eucharist is the memorial of Christ's Passover, that is, of the work of salvation accomplished by the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, a work made present by the liturgical action. (CCC, 1409) It is Christ himself, the eternal high priest of the New Covenant who, acting through the ministry of the priests, offers the Eucharistic sacrifice. And it is the same Christ, really present under the species of bread and wine, who is the offering of the Eucharistic sacrifice. (CCC, 1410) The essential signs of the Eucharistic sacrament are wheat bread and grape wine, on which the blessing of the Holy Spirit is invoked and the priest pronounces the words of consecration spoken by Jesus during the Last Supper: "This is my body which will be given up for you. ... This is the cup of my blood. ..." (CCC, 1412) By the consecration, the transubstantiation of the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ is brought about. Under the consecrated species of bread and wine Christ himself, living and glorious, is present in a true, real, and substantial manner: his Body and his Blood, with his soul and his divinity. (CCC, 1413) As sacrifice, the Eucharist is also offered in reparation for the sins of the living and the dead and to obtain spiritual or temporal benefits from God. (CCC, 1414) Communion with the Body and Blood of Christ increases the communicant's union with the Lord, forgives his venial sins, and preserves him from grave sins. Since receiving this sacrament strengthens the bonds of charity between the communicant and Christ, it also reinforces the unity of the Church as the Mystical Body of Christ. (CCC, 1416)

The prayers of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist speak clearly of the transforming effects of the Holy Spirit.

At Baptism, we pray over the water: "Father, look now with love upon your Church, and unseal for her the fountain of baptism. By the power of the Holy Spirit give to this water the grace of your Son, so that in the sacrament of baptism all those whom you have created in your likeness may be cleansed from sin and rise to a new birth of innocence by water and the Holy Spirit" (Christian Initiation of Adults, #222A).

At Confirmation, we learn what this new life in the Spirit implies: "All-powerful God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, by water and the Holy Spirit you freed your sons and daughters from sin and gave them new life. Send your Holy Spirit upon them to be their helper and guide. Give them the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of right judgment and courage, the spirit of knowledge and reverence. Fill them with the spirit of wonder and awe in your presence" (Christian Initiation of Adults, #234).

At Eucharist, with our sins washed away and clothed with the Spirit, we are led to the banquet table of the Lord's Supper. At each Eucharist we ask God to send the Spirit upon the bread and wine so that they become for us the Body and Blood of Christ. Then we pray that the Holy Spirit comes upon us—we who eat and drink—so that we may become the Body of Christ **In summary, I invite all to come to the noon Mass on August 4th to witness this beautiful sacrament.** Father Mark S14 page 3
