

From the Pastor 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time - A August 2, 2020

"WOULD YOU LIKE TO HOLD MY BABY?" Let me be clear: this is NOT what our Blessed Mother asked the Priest we

honor this week; nor am I being disrespectful. For on Christmas Eve, 1517, this holy man had a vision in which the *Virgin Mother*, who's *Assumption* into heaven we celebrate this week, offered him the honor of holding the *Baby Jesus!* What some dismiss as a pious legend or cute story offers two very profound ideas. More on how he put this vision into action after a few comments about his background and upbringing.

Born in Italy on October 1, 1480, into a wealthy, noble family, Gaetano di Conte di Thiene - now known as Saint Cajetan [CADGE-eh-tin] - was raised with his two brothers by a pious mother who had a special devotion to our **Blessed Mother**. He studied law and theology, became a senator, served on Pope Julius II's curia, enjoying all the privileges and prestige of being in a papal court. When the pope died, he fulfilled his desire to become a Priest; after he was ordained in 1516 [at 36: a very delayed vocation back then!], he returned to northern Italy and joined a confraternity of men who cared for the poor and lived very simply, which shocked his family and friends. But what he did for the next 31 years, until his death on August 7, 1547, which is now his Feast Day, is what made him a Saint! First, pray the Collect for the Mass in his honor, then we will explain.

<u>Collect - Saint Cajetan, Priest</u> O God, who endowed the Priest Saint Cajetan with the grace of imitating the apostolic way of life, grant us, through his example and intercession, to trust in you at all times and to seek unceasingly your Kingdom. Through our Lord Jesus ... for ever and ever. Amen.

"WHATSOEVER YOU DO TO THE LEAST..." Who would not want to hold and hug the *Christ Child* wrapped in His swaddling clothes; who does not hope to one day hold and hug the *Body* of the *Risen Lord*? But are we as willing to hug and hold Him as He comes to us in the least of His brothers and sisters, the poor and needy, the sick and dying? *Saint Cajetan* did, first in his native area, and then in Rome, where he joined the *Oratory of Divine Love,* a group devoted to piety and charity. In 1522, he founded a hospital for the terminally ill in Venice and took even a more intense vow of poverty so he could be just like the Christ he saw in those to whom he ministered.

"UNLESS YOU BECOME LIKE CHILDREN." While many Orders begged for the supplies they needed to care for the needy, Saint Cajetan went one step further. To show his total, childlike trust in God's providence, he and his confreres did not even seek alms; they relied only on *Jesus'* promise to provide all we need! And like those who plead with people to get along with each other, Saint Cajetan sought peaceful, respectful dialogue and strove to maintain Church unity - unlike Martin Luther and other Reformers, who split from the Church, or those who, on both sides, sadly turned to violence and hateful rhetoric. And as the Council of Trent [1545-1563] began the Counter-Reformation, he pleaded with everyone not to be too lax or too severe, willing or unwilling to change, conservative or liberal, etc. He wisely chose the middle road, and so should we, when it comes to the 'negotiables.'

"I WILL BE IN YOU; YOU WILL BE IN ME." We must not, however, think that *Saint Cajetan* was weak or wishy-washy; far from it! He endured many sufferings for daring to challenge and confront corrupt Clergy and Religious Sisters and Brothers. While his holy example led many to repent, some turned vehemently against him. But by preaching correct doctrine, encouraging frequent reception of the *Sacraments*, caring for the sick, truly living their vow of poverty, offering proper scriptural teachings and conducting dignified liturgies, he and his Order BECAME the Christ we who call ourselves Christian must be!

PATRON SAINT OF THE UNEMPLOYED. In the last years of his life, *Saint Cajetan* founded the not-forprofit Bank of Naples that prohibited taking advantage of the poor or using their plight against them. Because of this and his concern for the poor who often lacked meaningful jobs, he is the Patron Saint of the Unemployed, of Gamblers, and of those sickened by plagues. *Saint Cajetan, pray for us.*

Please pray for our children. We will start having our children receive Holy Communion in small groups starting this Sunday.
