

From the Pastor 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - A September 6, 2020

ALL ARE WELCOME IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH! Did you know that Sacramental registers as far back as the late 1500's record the baptism of slaves, or those sold by their own people in Africa? While most were baptized when they

reached the New World, some were baptized en route, others in their native country. This counters the claim that - for centuries - the Catholic Church did not believe dark-skinned Africans had souls! While she DID, at one point, declare they do have souls, she did so to refute those who said they did not! Here are more facts:

We have had three African Popes. Saint Victor I [Pope #14, reigned 189-199] set the schema we still use for setting Easter's date; Saint Melchiades [#32; 311-314] signed the Emperor Constantine's laws ending persecutions and making

Christianity the Roman Empire's religion; Saint Gelasius | [#49; 492-496] clarified our Eucharistic doctrines. Among New Testament Africans are Simon of Cyrene, who helped carry Jesus' Cross and Deacon Philip's Ethiopian convert. Among African-born Saints are Augustine and his mother Monica; the female martyrs Perpetua and Felicity; the male martyrs Charles Lwanga and his **Companions**; recently canonized Josephine Bakhita. The Venerable Pierre **Toussaint**, a former slave and New York hairdresser who died in 1853 and is buried in Saint Patrick Cathedral, is [hopefully] on his way to Sainthood. According to 2018 statistics, 20% of Roman Catholics are black. So, it is only right that, with all that has been going on, we honor Saint Peter Claver, whose powerful story attests to the Catholic Church's protection of - and love

for - her African-born children.

O God, who made Saint Peter Claver a slave of slaves and strengthened him with wonderful charity and patience as he came to their help, grant, through his intercession, that, seeking the things of Jesus Christ, we may love our neighbor in deeds and in truth. Through our Lord Jesus ... for ever and ever. Amen.

A SLAVE OF SLAVES.' Born into a poor family in Spain in 1581, Saint Peter Claver was educated by the Jesuits, the Religious Order he joined when he was about 20. As a student, he was influenced by a simple Jesuit Brother who served as doorkeeper, and who was also canonized a Saint with him in 1888. Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez encouraged him to help save the 'millions of perishing souls' being brought to the Americas as slaves. While 'racial' slavery was condemned by Pope Eugene IV in 1435, long before Europeans 'discovered' America, and by Pope Paul III [reigned 1534-1549], it continued to be widely practiced,

even by Catholics. Saint Peter was so moved by their pitiable plight that in 1610 he left Spain, never to return, sailed to the main slave trading reception site in the Americas: Cartagena, in what is now Columbia, was ordained a Priest in 1615 and began his mercy-mission, dubbing himself, "A slave of slaves."

In a letter written by Father Claver [from his Feast Day's Office of Readings: September 9] we get a glimpse of the horrors he faced; here are some clips: "numerous blacks ... disembarked from a large ship ... the sick were lying on the wet ground [or] puddles of mud ... [and] ... were naked ... [we covered them with] ... our own cloaks ... and to ask the owners for [clothes] would have been a waste of words ... they [were] convinced ... they had been brought here to be eaten ... we bathed their faces and bodies ... began an elementary instruction about baptism ... [and] about the one God, who rewards and punishes each one according to his merit, and the rest." After 40 years of service, Saint Peter died in 1654, having baptized over 300,000!

"WE SPOKE TO THEM, NOT WITH WORDS BUT WITH OUR HANDS AND OUR ACTIONS." Those who now criticize him 'imposing' religion on slaves, and not doing more to free them, are not dealing with *Saint Peter's* reality. Calls to release them would have been fruitless; he did the most he could do, given the circumstances. And by baptizing them, he was able to chide their 'owners' to treat them more humanely, as brothers and sisters in Christ. Saint Peter Claver, pray for us and for an end to all racial disharmony
