Living Lent in the Jubilee Year 2025

Home or business owners and *Parish Administrators* know that upkeep, repair and replacement issues never end. Currently, *Pastors* are also *Administrators*, who must see that all spiritual and temporal items entrusted to them are properly maintained. Many learn the hard way that attention to the seemingly least significant details, preventative measures, taking advantage of professionals who have a keener eye, and similar proactive procedures - saves money. The same is true of our souls. Human weaknesses, quirks, and thoughtlessness easily lead to bad habits, which can become venial sins, which can fester into mortal sins. So, we must be attentive to the condition of our soul, not just our home, business and parish.

CLEAN OUT THE JUNK. The holy season of Lent - and the spiritual events of a Holy or Jubilee Year - help us get our souls into tiptop shape. 5 sets of Examinations of Conscience [each week's bulletin will have one] can prepare us to seek God's pardon and peace in the Sacrament of Penance. Purged of all sin, we can make room for God's grace. How and when to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing are listed in this insert.

CHECK THE FOUNDATION. Jesus warned that a house built on sand will collapse and be ruined. [Cf: Matthew 7:24-27] This insert lists many sources, at the Parish and online, that can deepen and develop your Faith. Lent's pious practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving can also help. There are many ways to fortify your foundation: Eucharistic Adoration or simply 'making a visit;' Stations of the Cross; receiving Eucharist each day; donating to the Bishop's Annual Appeal, CRS Rice Bowl [mite boxes are available in the narthex], our Food Pantry cart, a poor box - or doing any loving deed.

CHECK THE STRUCTURAL STABILITY. Sacraments and the venerable Lenten devotions not only build a firm foundation - they also attune our mind and heart to keep us firm in our Faith.

misunderstood aspects of Catholicism is indulgences. They are based on Christ's commission of Peter and the other Apostles [our first Pope and Bishops] to bind or to loose all that that may - or may not - help us get through the Gates entrusted to Saint Peter. So, the Church has the right - and the duty - to declare what is best - and what is not good - for our spiritual life.

At one time, most *American Catholics* were barely literate, with scant formal education, and spoke little, if any, *English*. Most were immigrants, trying to blend into their new home, working day and night - with no time for faith formation or reading bulletin articles! So, things like *indulgences* were explained very simply: performing pious acts, taking part in certain *Rites*, saying special prayers, visiting designated *Shrines* or holy places, etc., freed you from a set number of days in *Purgatory and* the *punishment* due from the sins we confess and for which we receive *absolution*.

Here's an often-used analogy that can help explain indulgences. If I break your window, and ask you to forgive me, you may or may not do so. [God always forgives truly repentant sinners!] But even if, like God, you do forgive me, that broken window must still be replaced, and there's a cost involved. You could ask me to cough up the money or tell me not to worry about it and pay for it yourself. IN A WAY [for all analogies 'limp'], that is what an indulgence does: it 'pays for' some of the punishment we deserve and damage we caused by our forgiven sins. So, indulgences are like 'insurance' that 'covers' the 'expenses' we incur in the sinful storms of life. I will say more in a future bulletin article on Indulgences.

With my hope that we will all use this *Lent* to upkeep, repair and replace whatever our bodies and souls need to face the *Ultimate Building Inspector - God -* when he calls us from our temporary earthly home and, *God* willing, into our eternal heavenly home. *Happy Lent!*

Ash Wednesday March 5

Blessed ashes mark the start of our Lenten journey of self-denial, penance and prayer. Ashes are a sign of

repentance <u>and</u> mortality, so those of <u>any age</u> may receive ashes. <u>Heed</u> the words used to impose ashes: "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." or "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return."

Ashes are distributed <u>during</u> Mass at:

8:00 am - 12 noon - 7:00 pm

and at a Liturgy of the Word

[no Holy Communion]

at 4:30 pm.

Easter Precept or Easter Duty

All *Catholics* are obligated to receive *Holy Communion* at least once a year, between the 1st Sunday of Lent, March 9, and The Most Holy Trinity Sunday, June 15. Those conscious of serious, grave or mortal sin must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance [go to Confession] before receiving Holy Communion.

Fast & Abstinence Guidelines

Those 14 and older are to *ABSTAIN* from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Lenten Fridays. Those between 18 and 59 should *FAST* by eating only one main meal and

two smaller ones on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Those unable to abstain or fast for a valid reason [i.e., St. Patrick's Day party or wedding] may abstain on another day or perform a different penance; Canon law only permits PASTORS to dispense from fasting or abstaining. Ignoring penitential days, without good cause, is a serious sin of omission. Our Bishops ask us to abstain from meat on Fridays all year long for Pro-Life causes and world peace.

Sunday at 8:00 - 9:30 - 11:30 am

Daily Mass during Lent

Monday: 7:00 pm (3/10 to 3/31)

Monday through Thursday: 8:00 am

The Sunday obligation is mandatory, but also try to attend a weekday Mass, if possible, to receive Holy Communion.

Food Collection - CRS Rice Bowl

To help feed the hungry locally and abroad, donate to Catholic Relief Services' Rice Bowl' [CRSRB], collections on Ash Wednesday and the 5th Sunday of Lent or donate money and/or nonperishable food to our St. Vincent de Paul cart to the right of the main doors. Return <u>CRSRB</u> mite boxes, found in the narthex, by Holy Thursday, to the CRSRB box in the narthex.

Lenten Reflection

Spend some time reflecting on your life. Is there anything that you have lost interest in? What has gone to ashes? Prayer? Discipleship? Enthusiasm? Joy? Hope? Trust? Perhaps we need to fast from noise and busyness in order to hear God speaking in the silence. Perhaps we need to fast from television and entertainment in order to hear God in the cries of the poor and the stranger. The Lord says, "Return to me with all your heart!" God pleads for our return. "Now is the acceptable time!" says St. Paul. Don't wait. The gospel gives us the spiritual tools of almsgiving, prayer, and fasting for bringing cold embers back to life.

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Stations of the Cross: Wednesday Evenings

Many parishes pray the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent. We made the decision to pray them on Wednesday evenings to accommodate those who cannot come on Friday evenings. This will give people more opportunities to experience this rich tradition of the Church. If someone is not able to come on a Wednesday evening they can go to a local parish on a Friday evening. Likewise, people in other parishes can come to our parish on a Wednesday night if they are unable to go on a Friday evening. Many people in our parish like to go to the Knights of Columbus on Friday evenings for the Lenten suppers. This will allow them to do so.

There are many formats for the *Stations of the Cross.*All of them are beautiful. This year Stations will be prayed at 7:00 pm and will be led by:

March 12: Holy Innocents Society

March 19: Religious Education Students

March 26: Altar Rosary Society

April 2: Altar Servers

April 9: Men's Faith Group/HNS, OCIA
Good Friday—April 18: Living Stations by our Youth
Group

When we do pray the Stations of the Cross, we can also connect them with the baptismal character of Lent if we place the stations themselves in the context of the whole paschal mystery. In Baptism we are plunged into the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection, and our baptismal commitment includes a willingness to give our life for others as Jesus did. Recalling his passion and death can remind us that we, too, may be called to suffer in order to be faithful to the call of God.

The liturgy never focuses on the death of Christ without recalling his resurrection. The resurrection is an integral part of the paschal mystery.

The Sacrament of Penance [Reconciliation or Confession]

We can enjoy the <u>primary</u> sacramental experience of God's mercy by confessing our sins. While only all <u>mortal</u> sins <u>must</u> be confessed, this <u>Rite's</u> sacramental grace also washes away all lesser, venial sins. And a spiritual 'check-up' helps nip sinful habits in the bud,

before they bloom into full-blown sins, and strengthens us against temptation and other distractions. Those guilty of mortal sin may <u>NOT</u> receive <u>Holy Communion</u> until they confess them to a <u>Priest</u>. <u>Confession</u> is also encouraged in <u>Lent</u> and <u>Advent</u>, before a <u>Baptism</u>, <u>Confirmation</u> or <u>Wedding</u>, or serving as a <u>Sponsor</u> or <u>Godparent</u>. Throughout <u>Lent</u> we will print a variety of <u>Examinations</u> of <u>Conscience</u> in the bulletin to assist you in preparing for <u>Confession</u>, as we did last <u>Advent</u>:

All children are invited to our special *Children's Liturgy* of the Word at <u>ALL</u> Masses this weekend; before Mass all children are invited to the center aisle; after the *Procession* they go to see a ½ hour age-appropriate video on *Christ's Passion*, *Death* and *Resurrection* and return later than usual, during the *Lord's Prayer*.

The Sacred Triduum & Paschal Fast

Lent ends as we begin Holy Thursday's Mass of the Lord's Supper; we then enter the shortest but most central liturgical time: the three-day Easter Triduum. To more fully join in Christ's Death and Resurrection, all are strongly encouraged to join in all Triduum events and the Paschal Fast, which is even more intense than the Lenten fast: all should fast from Good

Friday until the Easter Vigil "as a way of coming to the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection with uplifted and welcoming hearts." [Ceremonial of Bishops # 295]

Holy Thursday - April 17

To begin the Transfer of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Holy Thursday's Mass of the Lord's Supper, the Eucharist is reverenced with incense and then carried, covered with a humeral veil, through the church, and into the Place of Repose

We solemnly celebrate Jesus' parting gifts of love: His abiding Presence in the *Eucharist*; His care and concern for us in the *Ordained Priesthood*; and our call to continue His work in *Christian Service*. For as Jesus said after washing the Apostles' feet: "If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet. I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do." [John 13:14-15]. In the Mass of the Lord's Supper, we serve by washing feet, giving alms through CRS Rice Bowl, and 'watching one hour' with the Lord at the Place of Repose through Night Prayer and then until Good Friday's 3 PM Service.

Good Friday – April 18

The Cross which is in the narthex during Lent is brought into the church during Good Friday's Service. After all adore it, it is carried to all unable to come to it; then it is affixed in the Sanctuary for the Stations of the Cross. Throughout Eastertime, it reigns in the garden which is in the narthex as a promise that all who die with Christ will live with Christ forever!

We meditate on *Christ's Passion* and *Death* with ancient rituals and in profound silence. The church is

open all day for private prayer and for public services: Morning Prayer, the Main Celebration of the Passion of the Lord and the annual 'Living Stations' performed and delivered by our Youth Group. <u>All</u> should visit the church this solemn day to thank <u>God</u> for His redeeming love!

Holy Saturday - April 19

Ancient tradition prohibits *holy Mass* on this day; we keep watch at the tomb in solemn prayer. Pray for those who will be baptized and welcomed into our *Church* during this day of prayerful reflection.

The Easter Vigil in the Holy Night April 19 - 7:30 pm

Church law strictly requires that the ONLY Masses permissible on Holy Saturday begin AFTER nightfall, in darkness, so there can be no 5:00 pm Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. The Easter Vigil in the Holy Night Mass, the climax of the liturgical year, which begins at 7:30 pm, is a four-part ritual with roots in antiquity. The four parts are:

SERVICE OF LIGHT. The *Paschal Candle*, symbol of the *Risen Christ*, lit from the blessed fire, is brought into the darkened church. As all light their candle from the *Christ-Light*, the darkness of the tomb erupts into the warm glow of the *Risen Lord's* presence!

LITURGY OF THE WORD. We tell our scriptural story of God's marvelous, saving deeds throughout history.

LITURGY OF BAPTISM & CONFIRMATION. With blessed Easter Water we renew our Baptismal Promises and welcome our newest members through the Sacraments of Initiation, making God's saving deeds and the Risen Lord truly alive in us, His Church!

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST. In the highpoint of the Great Three Days and the entire year, our newest members share Eucharist with us for the first time. We renew our pledge to become Eucharist by being Christ's Risen presence in our world.

<u>NOTE</u>: There is NO 5:00 pm Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday; the <u>ONLY MASS</u> is 7:30 pm!
