# **ADVENT**


Advent is a Christian liturgical season. It is the period of preparation for both Christmas and the Second Coming of Christ. It extends over the four Sundays preceding Christmas. The first Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of the church year.

## **ADVENT IDEAS FOR FAMILIES**

#### Christkind

The German term for "Christ Child" is Christkind. It is the name of an old European Advent practice. It is the custom to pick the name of a secret "Christ Child" before the beginning of the season. Starting with the first day of Advent, everyone does special acts of kindness for their "Christ Child." This practice should continue throughout the season of Advent.

Families can begin a new tradition this Advent. A few days before Advent begins, the family should come together to draw a name of someone as a Christ Child. Throughout Advent, do anonymous good deeds for that person. Pray daily for your *Christkind* asking for an abundance of God's love, peace and joy to flow into that person's life. Each person should try to



keep the name of his/her Christ Child a secret until Christmas Eve. Then a small gift should be given to each Christkind revealing the secret name.

# Meatless Meals During Advent

Legend has it that the animals were the first to see the Infant Jesus. In many cultures, Christmas Eve dinner is a meatless one honoring the animals' present at the birth of Jesus. Families can start this custom in their homes by eating several meatless dinners together during Advent.

France: Pere Noel (Father Christmas)


Russia: In some parts—Babouschka (a grandmotherly figure). In other parts of Russia, it is Grandfather Frost.
