The Catholic Church has dedicated the month of May to Mary, the Mother of Jesus. This dedication originated with the Jesuits and later spread throughout the Church. Special devotions to Mary, including preparing May altars with flowers, processions and the recitation of the rosary, became a practice throughout the Latin Church.

TEACH CHILDREN TO STAND UP FOR THEMSELVES

When your child is facing a problem with another child, the best thing you can do is help him/her figure out how to handle the problem on his/her own. Sometimes you do have to get directly involved if your child cannot handle it or if he or she is in danger.

Ideally, helping your children develop their own protective responses will enable them to become more self sufficient. When your child comes to you about a problem situation, help him/her work out a solution by role-playing the situation. Help your child discover several alternate ways of dealing with difficult people. If the problem continues to persist, a meeting with the teacher or the other child's parents may become necessary.

Anna Jarvis of Pennsylvania is credited with inspiring the establishment of a day to honor all mothers. Anna's mother was an active worker in church and community affairs.

Shortly after her mother's death, Anna arranged a special memorial service in the church her mother had attended. The idea of the service was well received and spread to other churches in the area. On the second Sunday of May, 1908, churches in the city of Philadelphia observed their first Mothers' Day services.

These services were so widely acclaimed that Jarvis persistently campaigned for nation-wide observance. Through her power of persuasion, Senator Burkett of Nebraska introduced a bill into congress designating the second Sunday in May as a national Mothers' Day. In May, 1914, the bill was passed, signed by President Wilson, making it law.

Memorial Day

Memorial Day is the day set aside each year for the purpose of honoring soldiers who died in service to their country. It began as a day commemorating the soldiers who fought in the Civil War.

After the hostilities between Union and Confederate forces ceased, the widows and friends of slain Southerners showed their love and gratitude to their fallen heroes by decorating their graves. They also decorated the graves of the northern dead. The news of this tribute flashed across the North like a ray of hope.

In 1868, General John Logan, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.), showed his admiration for this custom by issuing an order designating May 30th as a day for all G.A.R. posts to honor the Civil War dead.

Memorial Day is now a national holiday honoring all those who have died in military service. It falls on the last Monday in May.
