## Educating for Justice

Christians are asked to stand up for justice anytime they become aware of an injustice. Many have heard the saying that "peace begins with me." One can add, "Justice begins with me, too."

Parents of young children realize quite readily how early their children develop a sense of fairness. These insights must be confirmed in everyday experiences of owning, sharing, and giving.

Parents must be examples of justice and fairness in the home. Children growing up in a home where these virtues are practiced regularly begin to transfer their knowledge to issues of peace and justice in their neighborhoods and schools. Maturing in the Christian virtue of justice helps young Christians apply the principals of justice to issues of prejudice, racism, human rights, violence, stealing, and cheating.

## Some Suggestions for Families

- Become peacemakers in your own families, school and neighborhood.
- Find out more about people who are oppressed. How can you help?
- Welcome someone of another race or nationality into your parish or neighborhood.
- Volunteer your services to a home for the elderly, a food bank, soup kitchen, hospital, or a work project at your parish/school.
- Write letters to your legislators about human rights, poverty programs, peace efforts, or any other justice issues your family feels strongly about.
